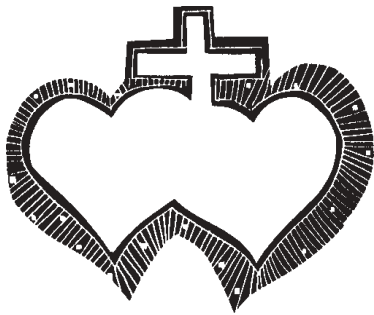

## Editor's Corner

I call this one "Retreat Reflections," because that's what I have here for you today. My own, and the ones from Celisse and Pat. How can I sum up an entire weekend in a short partial page? I can't. I can't begin to describe the wonder and majesty I felt in the rolling hills of Auburn, California, during the Parish Retreat on October 5, 6, and 7. And yet, I must, if you are to have any idea of what it's like or why you might want to go yourself someday.

This retreat was very different from the last one I attended in 2002, but then each one is, by definition, unique. The synergy of the group, the enthusiasm of the leader, the participation of those attending, all these things and more combine to create the atmosphere of any retreat. I think ours was a good match. I felt an extreme sense of belonging in our little group. I felt contentment, both from within and without. I felt peace, in our own group, the group who shared our accommodations, and the staff of the Center.

I found joy in the Center's bookstore, in shared Eucharist, and in wonderful food. I found love in the garden path where deer slept among the Stations of the Cross, on the grassy hillside where Mary held the infant Jesus out to anyone who stopped to stand at her feet, and in shared chocolate for morning coffee. I found hope in the hangings of the common room wall, in the pictures depicting the Sisters' mission along the first floor hallway, and in the fluid contours of a huge tree just outside my window. I found grace in Morning and Evening Prayer, the simple comfort of my room, and in the act of leaving doors unlocked. I found compassion in photocopied hymns, protection in sleeping with windows open, and a bit of humility in making my own bed.

And I found God: in the place, the people, and in each one of the St. John's parishioners who attended. I heartily recommend attending a retreat if you ever have the chance. They're all different, but they're all good for the soul.

# Search Committee

The continuing saga...

As of this reading your Search Committee will have completed the first section (community demographics) of the thirteen-section study guide. When all the sections have been completed, we will have a Parish Profile. This Parish Profile is the instrument used by churches searching for a rector. The national church will send it, online, to all dioceses. Locally, we will have it on our Web site and also will mail copies to any interested candidate.

Section Two (parish demographics) gives a picture of our current membership. Again, your Search Committee will need your help to ascertain this information. The method we will use to do this is as follows: the committee will present you with a different open-ended question each week during the Sunday and Thursday services. If you miss a Sunday, you can answer that question the following Sunday/Thursday. Most questions will be asked of parishioners age ten and up. Your committee asks that you complete each question thoughtfully and honestly. If you should miss a service the cards (with the question) will be available at the church; all we ask is that you turn in the cards promptly.

The search committee hopes to make this information gathering interesting, convenient, and a relative experience. We believe that this method of inquiry will involve every member in the congregation and will give each member a voice in selecting our next rector.

# Mission Memories

Dear Friends,

Mission 2007 was the answer to a childhood dream. I joined the original group because growing up as an Episcopalian I had heard people talk about missionaries and while I never really knew what they did, it sounded enticing. To me, missionaries were people in far away countries like Africa, China, or South America. I never realized they could also work in their own country, helping to improve conditions in their own backyard.

As we began to plan our journey, I was pleased to learn we would be remaining in America. I feel there are many opportunities here but I was uncertain as to what role I would play. What did I have to offer? I had spent my adult life as a cosmetologist, wife and mother raising four active children.

As our plans jelled I was told that three of us (Linda, Margie, and myself) would be part of a mobile respite unit delivering supplies to the lower ninth ward of New Orleans. Each day we went to the area that was the hardest hit when the levees broke. The devastation was amazing and my brain had a hard time absorbing it. In front of an abandoned Walgreens store we greeted people and gave them our meager offerings. It was during that time I realized what I had to offer was myself. I could listen to the stories they were compelled to retell even after almost two years. Oddly enough, I find myself doing the same thing each time someone asks me, "How was New Orleans?" I feel like a spider luring people into my web! The people we met have so much spirit and boundless love and I know they will rebuild because their roots run deep in the Louisiana soil.

Since my return, I have thought a lot about my own roots and about how I felt growing up in a small university town. Today we call it Silicone Valley but I loved it then and now and my memories are many. I know I, too, would rebuild.

It has been two years since Katrina and the re-building is pitifully slow. I wish I had the skills and the youth to do the physical rebuilding. There isn't a day that goes by that I don't think of those people. If it wasn't for the generous outpourings of love and support from churches all over the country the city wouldn't be as far as it is. I would repeat this experience in a heartbeat and I encourage each of you to consider joining our next mission. Perhaps we can double our team; wouldn't that be great! As Father Tony said, you will never be the same again.

## Message From The (Interim) Rector



On November 11 we will have as a guest preacher Brother Jude of the Society of Saint Francis. These Episcopalian Franciscans live at San Damiano Friary in San Francisco. Their house is on Dolores Street, close to the centuries-old Franciscan Mission Church, which predates the gold rush of 1849, surviving the great earthquake of 1906. It reminds the many visiting pilgrims and tourists that the patron saint of the city was, and still is, St. Francis. The Mission Church is one of a string of mission churches established by Franciscan missionaries who led the way to the settlement of what is now California.

San Damiano Friary reminds us there are still Franciscans in the heart of San Francisco. San Damiano is home for seven Brothers, and Brother Jude is the Superior. He is also the Provincial Superior of the Society of St. Francis in North and South America. San Damiano is also home for a group of men in training to become friars. In recent months several young brothers have moved to other houses in the US, including New York. In addition to studies, they share ordinary domestic duties and assist in Episcopal parishes throughout the Bay Area and street and hospice ministries in the Castro district. Brother Jude, for example, also engages in a Night Ministry that offers a telephone counseling service and on-street encounters. Each Brother is expected to earn sufficient income to contribute to the support of the community.

Brother Jude is English and retains his Lancashire accent, though he has lived many years in the US. He is a Doctor of Psychology and has clients in therapy. He was recently ordained to the priesthood in Grace Cathedral and acts as an occasional chaplain and consultant to Katherine, our presiding Bishop. He is a close personal friend of Cheryl and me and is mentor to Cheryl who is now doing a similar doctoral course in clinical psychology. San Damiano is truly our second home; we first met there in May, 2005.

How many of our congregation at St. John's realize there are monks and nuns in the American Episcopal Church? How many know about the Franciscan Third Order, made up of ordinary men and women, who follow the Franciscan rule adapted to ordinary secular life? I hope you will be intrigued and want to know more. Sunday, November 11 will be a very special occasion when Brother Jude will preach at both the 8:30 am Eucharist and the 10:30 am Inter-Generational Eucharist. He and another Brother will be available to meet and talk over refreshments.

Please encourage friends and acquaintances to come to St John's for this very important occasion. All will be very welcome.
