The Gift of Adult Forum

We have now completed two Sundays on the “new Schedule” and while it’s clear we are still in the adjustment phase---everybody has to get out of bed earlier---one of the gifts of the new schedule is the Adult Forum.

We now have time on Sunday morning to devote to spiritual formation. You may recall, The Rev. Anne Smith used this term several months ago. Some see it as a kind of a new-fangled term for Christian education, but it is actually more than that. The “formation” part suggests that something is going on that actually forms us, and yes, maybe even trans-forms us all the time. And transformation is, after all, what Jesus was all about. Peoples’ lives were changed, that is transformed, whenever they encountered him.

And having a designated time for adults to gather on Sunday morning means there is time for listening, learning, discussing, and getting to know each other in slightly different ways. The last two Sundays we’ve had a wonderful experience watching the film, “For the Bible Tells Me So”, and discussing the scriptural passages to which it refers, as (I hope) our understanding of our own sexuality and that of others has been enhanced.

We plan to conclude our discussion of human sexuality on October 9th, also the day Bishop Talton will be with us. The Adult Forum Schedule for the next several weeks after October 9th appears on page 4.

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Blessing of the Animals Sunday- October 2

It is always a joy to provide an opportunity to bless our animals on the Feast of Blessed Francis of Assisi. This year at St. John's we will offer this blessing outside during the regular 10:45 a.m. liturgy.

We will gather in the area just outside the south doors with our animals. The liturgy at 10:45 will be much abbreviated, the songs will be simple, your favorite pet (or photo of your pet) will be blessed. We will have communion.

The Blessing of the Animals with Eucharist outside will be our only worship at 10:45 on this day, so that we can have a more relaxed Sunday experience. Perhaps you can invite a friend who would not feel comfortable in one of our regular worship services. And for those for whom animals and outside liturgies and communion with animal crackers is not their "thing", we invite you to the 8:00 a.m. liturgy that day, which will remain unchanged.

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes.

As happened last year, the Vestry has selected the New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During the liturgy on Consecration Sunday, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world.

Every attendee and member who completes an Estimate of Giving Card does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.

We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During both services our guest leaders, Bob and Debi Hall, will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship by placing their cards on the altar.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and vestry members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events.

ALL SAINTS, ALL SOULS' and ALL HALLOW'S EVE Sunday, October 30

They are really all part of the same holiday, and yes, it's a *Christian holiday*, although its origins are pre-Christian. In traditional cultures, the changing of the seasons were always recognized and celebrated, as they believed the solstices and equinoxes actually occurred at hinge points or gaps in time. At these "gaps" in time, it was believed that the world reverted back to the way it was before time began, at the creation. All those beings and powers, the seen and the unseen inhabitants of the world before, above or outside of time---gods, angels, ancestors, and spirits---were then present.

The Celtic pre-Christian festival of Samhain celebrated at the beginning of November, marked the coming of the dark, the death of the year, or growing season, and the start of winter. It was a huge festival during which bonfires were built and torches were carried to light up the night, to provide safe passage, because with all those gods and angels and ancestors and spirits running around, things can go one way or another.

The Church Christianized the festival, providing an opportunity to celebrate our brothers and sisters who have gone before us, leaving us with blessings too numerous to count. While there are many quirky customs associated with the festival; from dancing skeletons to children begging candles (an early form of trick-or-treating) it remains at its core a part of our faith. There's even a vigil service of All Hallows Eve among our Anglican heritage: "*From ghoulies and ghosties and things that go bump in the night, Good Lord Deliver us...*"

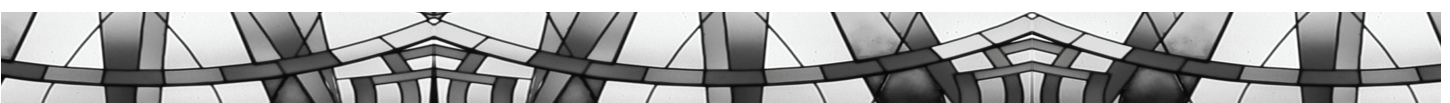
On All Saints' Sunday, October 30th, we will do our part to keep the tradition alive. These are all elements of the liturgy we participated in last year.

- * The names you've been submitting to be remembered in prayers that day will appear on a special altar frontal being prepared by our Sunday school children, and these names will also be chanted during the prayers of the people.
- * *Pan de los muertos*, the traditional Mexican bread taken to the cemetery and eaten in the presence of deceased family and friends, will be used during celebrations of the Holy Eucharist.
- * Another Mexican tradition uses yellow gladiolas and marigolds to decorate the altar and cemeteries. You can contribute to the designers' guild and remember your loved ones in this lovely way by calling the parish office.
- * And, because movement and action and candles are all important in worship, during communion, everyone will be able to light a candle and place it in our new "votive stand" at the altar as yet another way to say "Thank you" to those upon whose shoulders we stand.

Please join your worshipping community on this important festival. You'll be uplifted and encouraged and glad you did!

Adult Christian Formation

What a pleasure it has been to see so many people at our Adult Forums for the first few weeks of our new schedule! It is encouraging to see such an interest in learning and also to bring together members from both services to mingle in the middle.

We'll wrap up our current study on homosexuality in the Bible with the end of the film *For the Bible Tells Me So* on October 2 and a conversation with the Rev. Michelle Meech on October 9.

On **October 16**, A special presentation of "Godly Play" for adults. So that all in the parish understand the how and why of forming our 1st—3rd grade children.

On **October 23**, Lectionary Bible Study and Sermon Discussion. A study of the scriptures appointed for this Sunday (the churchy word is "prophets" for which there is a "lectionary") with reflections on the sermon of the day.

On **October 30**, Special Focus on the history and background of All Saints Day, one of our major Christian Festivals.

On **November 6**, New Consecration Sunday —No Adult Forum this day, just food and fellowship.

On **November 20**, Lectionary Bible Study and Sermon Discussion (same as October 23rd).

On **November 27**, Preparing for the Season of Advent.

Youth Fundraiser: Project CCR

Collect, Crush, Recycle: The children of St. John's are raising money to help meet the parish budget. They have set out large gray garbage cans near the kitchen to collect aluminum cans and plastic bottles. Bring yours and add them to the pile. The kids will crush them and our families will take them to be recycled. Money earned will be placed in the offering by the children. Help St. John's children help St. John's!

Update: In September, the children collected \$402 towards their goal. Great job, kids!



Children's Chapel

During the second service, all children of the parish are invited to join two adult facilitators in the Chapel for their own Liturgy of the Word. They will "set the table" each week with a cloth in the color of the liturgical season, a cross, chalice and paten, flowers, Bible, candle, and collection basket, remembering together what each item represents. Then they will explore one of the day's scripture stories together and do a brief activity before concluding with their own Prayers of the People. The children will return to sit with their parents during the Liturgy of the Table in the main church.

What: A time for worship, learning, scripture, and prayer just for kids

When: During the 10:45 service (kids start the service with their parents, proceed to the chapel after the first hymn, and return at the Peace)

Who: All children are welcome

Childcare for our smallest ones will continue to be available in the Nursery during the service.

Godly Play: Coming to a Church Near You!

What is Godly Play?

Godly play draws on the traditions of ancient storytelling. The primary goal is for teachers to model how to use the language of the Christian tradition through presentations of parables, sacred stories, liturgy and silence. The Godly Play sanctuary (classroom) provides a space to worship God and come into God's presence; not just speak about God.

There are only two adults required--a storyteller and door-person. These two adults are present to serve and guide the children and to support the community as it develops. Just as adults experience the Church as sacred space so do the children come to experience the Godly Play Sanctuary (classroom) as sacred space; their special place.

The heart of Godly Play is that it depends on personal response and spiritual engagement with God's word within a supportive, safe community of

friends. Consequently it 'works' with all ages, including adults, and it works well in groups with a wide age or ability range. Over years of being used in various settings (hospitals, prisons, schools, convalescent/nursing homes and churches) and with all ages, it has been found to convey such deep potential to reach and touch people's hearts and spirits directly, simply, where they are. And because it involves all the senses, children experience the story in many ways. They hear the spoken words, touch figures and move them about, watch with their eyes what happens as the story develops, and observe the beauty and order of their special space in which to work and play. They also learn to retell the stories to themselves or others. This entire process allows for the sacred stories of the Bible and the Church to come alive in each child as they experience God in their own unique way through scripture, prayerfulness, and playfulness.



Bishop Talton Visitation to St. John's October 9

It may seem that Bishop Talton was just with us (he was last April), as typically, congregations see their bishops about once a year. When Bishop Talton was at St. John's in April, he was here for a "getting to know" you visit, as he had just been installed as Provisional Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of San Joaquin.

A "visitation" is actually an official term signifying that the bishop visits the parish to see how things are going, to (generally) meet with the Vestry, and of course, to baptize and confirm any candidates who've been prepar-

ing for those sacraments.

When Bishop Talton makes his visitation on October 9th, he'll be celebrant and preacher at both liturgies. He'll join us during part of the Adult Forum, and we will enjoy a reception together welcoming our baptismal families and newly confirmed members during a reception following the 10:45 liturgy. The day will be complete if all in the parish can participate.

In addition to the choir preparing a special anthem for Confirmation, they have added descant parts to some of the sung Liturgical pieces in the service. The Arts at St. John's: Guitarist Brooks Williams Returns to St. John's in Concert

Named one of "America's Musical Treasures" by folk and world music magazine *Dirty Linen*, guitarist Brooks Williams returns to the Arts at St. John's on Saturday, October 15 at 7:30 p.m. Brooks performed at St. John's Episcopal Church in February 2010 with folk vocalist Debra Cowan to a wildly appreciative audience. The Arts at St. John's is pleased to bring him back to Lodi for a rare West Coast performance.

Named one of the *Top 100 Acoustic Guitarists*, with over 17 recordings to his name and nearly 24 years on the road, this Statesboro, Georgia, native and current UK resident is one of the premier singer/guitarists on the Roots n' Blues scene. Globally travelled, Brooks Williams brings his silky voice and bluesy finger-picking, soaring bottleneck slide, and swinging flat-picking guitar technique to deliver deep, intense interpretations from early blues songs to his fresh original compositions rooted in blues. Brooks began playing guitar at age 10 and taught himself to play by listening to recordings by Eric Clapton, Maria Muldaur, Bonnie Raitt, Ry

Cooder, and Taj Mahal among others. As a teenager in Boston, Brooks was introduced to roots and blues music on the radio and played in acoustic music clubs five to six nights a week. From there, a master grew.

Diocesan Convention 2011

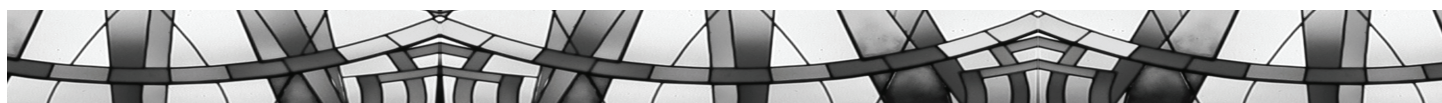

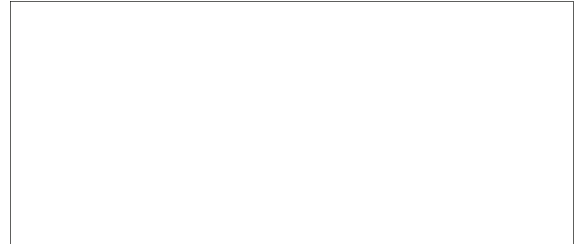
